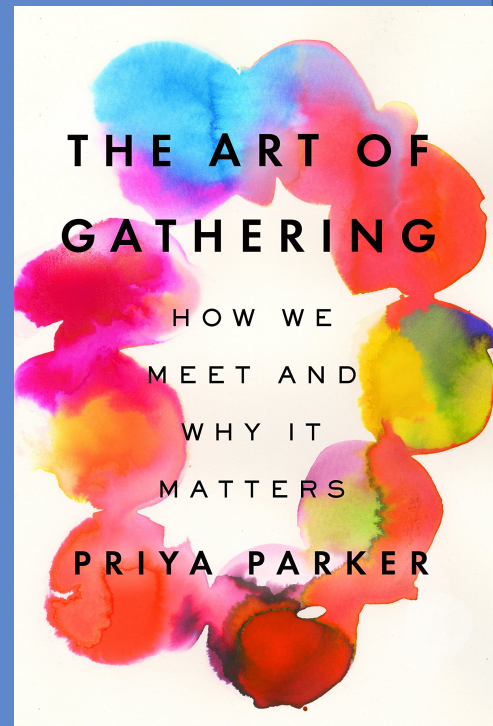

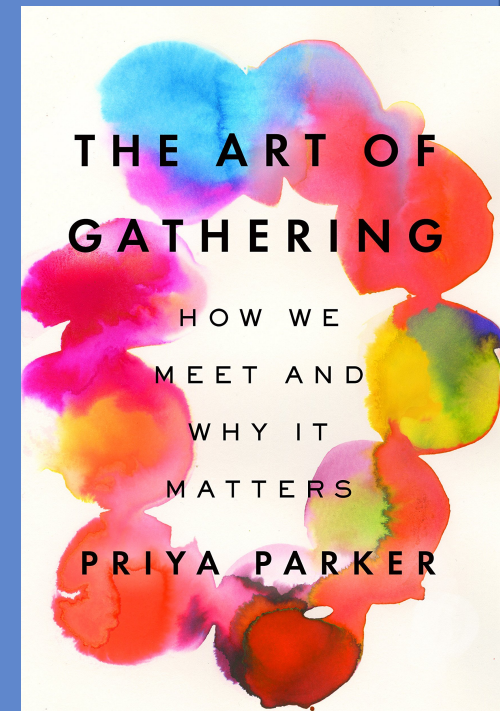

If you know, you know.

Familiarize yourself with the technology (venue) you are using before you dive in and implement it.

This way, you can establish a comfort level before leading your gathering.

Set everyone up for success.

Everybody has varying comfort levels and knowledge when it comes to technology. Know your audience and communicate clearly in advance of your gathering to help narrow the gap.

Whether it's providing explicit information on how to access the gathering or providing resources like tutorials and best practices... more = (usually) more.

Be intentional with preparation.

Just like there are best practices for running successful in-person gatherings, there are for virtual ones, too!

What are your goals?

What materials do you need to reference and have accessible during the experience?

What type of space are you looking to create: frontal/informational or interactive/group-based?

How do you want to use your visual capabilities? Can participants/attendees see each other, or just a screen you are sharing?

What group norms can you set at the beginning of a gathering to help everyone get on the same page?

Make space for everyone.

In Kabbalistic Jewish tradition, we learn about the act of *tzimtzum* – contracting to make space for the other.

As you facilitate your gathering, think about how much time you want to spend at the microphone (literally and figuratively) and how you can encourage others to be aware of this as well.

Use your resources.

If you're using tools like Zoom or Google Meet, there are a number of built-in and add-on features that can help navigate the gathering experience.

Breakout rooms

Pay attention to the details.

What's on your checklist before you click start?

- ✓ **Are you signed-in?**
- ✓ **How are your sound levels?**
- ✓ **What does your lighting look like?**
- ✓ **Did you choose a virtual background or set-up your environment?**
- ✓ **Are you in a location that minimizes background noise?**
- ✓ **If you are planning on sharing your screen to show any documents or webpages, are they cued up?**
- ✓ **Do you have to use the restroom?**

MEETING & GATHERING



FaceTime

For Apple users, a quick option for informal gatherings. In 2019, multi-user calls were added as a feature. If using a phone or tablet, you can flip your screen (great for virtual tours!) and add various visual effects.



Google Hangouts

If you or your organization uses Google apps (G-Suite), this can seamlessly integrate. Not ideal for medium or large gatherings due to viewer limitations.



Google Classroom

This is a learning management system which has the ability for synchronous video connection and easily connects to other Google apps.

Microsoft Teams

If you or your organization uses Microsoft apps (the 365 ecosystem), this can seamlessly integrate. Skype is still available on the Microsoft site for 1-to-1 usage.

With Zoom, you can host video calls and webinars with 1-10,000 people with many different features and add-ons. You can share your screen, record your gatherings, create experiences that toggle between small and large group configurations and much more. Zoom also allows phone access for paid accounts, allowing people to join calls by computer, tablet or phone call.
